Northeast Fishing Report

Cabresto Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Charette Lakes: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Cimarron River: Stream flow near Cimarron Monday morning was not measured due to ice. Fishing for trout was good using worms, salmon eggs and peach PowerBait. Maverick campground (gravel pit) was clear of most ice and fishable.

Clayton Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good using PowerBait and nightcrawlers.

Conchas Lake: Conchas Lake State Park has closed access to all boat ramps due to dropping water levels. The boat ramps on the south side of the lake, managed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, are open. Fishing for white bass was good using yellow grubs and crankbaits fished 25-feet deep. Fishing for walleye was fair using gold spoons. Fishing for catfish was fair using cut carp bait.

Costilla Creek: The Department has implemented the final phase of a project to expand Rio Grande cutthroat trout in 120 miles of the Costilla watershed in northern New Mexico. The final phase involved removal of fish within a designated area (Rio Costilla from Costilla Dam downstream to the Valle Vidal Boundary including all tributaries and Comanche Creek from the road culvert crossing on FR 1950 downstream to its confluence with Rio Costilla and all tributaries) with a tentative restocking of Rio Grande cutthroat in spring 2022. Places to fish nearby include Costilla Creek below the fish barrier, Upper Comanche Creek, Shuree Ponds, Middle Ponil Creek, Upper Powderhouse Creek, Little Costilla Creek, Vidal Creek and McCrystal Creek. The Department anticipates completion of this final phase in the fall of 2021. Please check the Department website for additional information on the project and to identify alternative angling opportunities in the interim.

Eagle Nest Lake: The lake is closed to ice fishing due to deteriorating ice conditions.

Red River: Stream flow below the hatchery Monday morning was 37.5 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair using small bead head nymph flies.

Rio Grande: Stream flow at the Taos Junction Bridge Monday morning was 484 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good using Panther Martin spinners and Woolly Buggers.

Rio Hondo: Stream flow Monday morning near Valdez was 24.9 cfs.

Rio Mora: Stream flow Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Rio Pueblo: Stream flow near Penasco Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: Fishing for trout was good using salmon eggs, spoons and Rapala lures.

Shuree Ponds: Closed until July 1, 2021.

Springer Lake: Fishing for pike was fair to good using chicken hotdogs and chicken liver.

Storrie Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Stubblefield Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Ute Lake: Fishing for white bass was fair trolling crankbaits in 10- to 15-feet of water. Fishing for smallmouth bass was slow to fair using spinnerbaits and chatterbaits. Fishing for walleye was slow. The water surface temperature was in the upper 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

Northwest Fishing Report

Abiquiu Lake: Fishing for walleye was fair using jigs.

Animas River: Water flow below Aztec Monday morning was 154 cfs.

Albuquerque Area Drains: Fishing for trout was fair to good using bead head nymph flies and PowerBait.

Bluewater Lake: Fishing for tiger muskie was good using jointed swim baits.

Chama River: Monday morning flows below El Vado and Abiquiu were 99.5 cfs and 44.1 cfs, respectively. Fishing for trout below El Vado Lake was fair to good using olive Wooly Bugger flies and Black Bunny Leech flies. Fishing for trout below Abiquiu Lake was good using San Juan worms, egg

pattern flies and bead head nymphs. Please remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway 84 at Abiquiu upstream seven miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters, with a bag limit of two trout only.

Cochiti Lake: Visitors to the lake need to make a reservation by purchasing a ticket at least 24 hours in advance through <u>www.recreation.gov</u>. Tickets and reservations will NOT be sold at the lake.

El Vado Lake: The lake is closed to ice fishing due to deteriorating ice conditions.

Fenton Lake: The lake is closed to ice fishing due to deteriorating ice conditions.

Heron Lake: The lake is closed to ice fishing due to deteriorating ice conditions.

Jemez Waters: Stream flow on the Jemez near the town of Jemez Monday morning was 48.8 cfs.

Laguna del Campo: Closed for the season; will open May 1, 2021.

Lagunitas Lakes: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Lake Farmington: Fishing for trout was fair using garlic PowerBait.

Manzano Lake: Closed until further notice.

McGaffey Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Navajo Lake: Fishing for trout was slow to fair using spinners and jointed lures.

San Juan River: Stream flow Monday morning was 408 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was good using size 20 chocolate foam wing emerger midge flies, UFO flies, egg pattern flies, chamois worms, crystal flash midges and red larva flies.

Tips and Tricks - Fishing with plastic lizards in the spring by Len Presto

Starting in May, or when you see lizards running around, is the time to try a plastic lizard. Smallmouth and largemouth bass can be particularly fond of plastic lizard baits. Make sure you find the pattern that best resembles the kinds of lizards present in the water you are fishing. I find that a smoky melon seeded 5.5-inch lizard resembles common New Mexico lizards. Lizard baits work well along the lake shore

as well as submerged in deeper water near structure. Eagle Claw TroKar worm hooks size 1/0 and Gamakatsu offset shank hooks size 1/0 work well with average lizard bait sizes. A bullet weight is a great way to achieve depth while fishing a lizard bait.

I have had great success with them at Brantley Lake, Bear Canyon Lake, Bluewater Lake, Clayton Lake, Escondida Lake, Elephant Butte Lake, Lake Roberts and Ute Lake.

Along with bass, I have also caught the occasional catfish and walleye using lizard baits.

Determine the depth of water you plan to fish. The deeper the water, the heavier the hook or bullet weight you need to use.

Lizards like to hunt the water's edge in search of insects. This makes them vulnerable to larger predatory fish, hoping that they make a fatal misstep. Fishing lizard baits can be a great way to trick those big aggressive fish.
