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**New Mexico COVID-19 update: 1,009 new cases, totaling  
253,024**

*Thirteen additional COVID-19 deaths*

SANTA FE – New Mexico state health officials on Thursday announced 1,009 additional COVID-19 cases. Per the state Department of Health, the most recent cases are:

- A male in his 40s from Bernalillo County. The individual had underlying conditions.
- A female in her 90s from San Juan County. The individual was hospitalized.

\*COVID related deaths are reported when a death certificate has been issued and some death certificates are delayed due to insufficient information.

As of today, there are 336 individuals hospitalized in New Mexico for COVID-19. The Department of Health strongly encourages the following groups to get tested:

- Symptomatic people displaying the COVID-19 symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, and/or loss of taste or smell;
- Asymptomatic people who are close contacts or household members of people in their infectious period who have already tested positive for the coronavirus;
- Asymptomatic people who live or work in congregate settings such as long-term care facilities and group homes;
- Patients who are scheduled for surgery and whose provider has advised them to get tested before the procedure.
