Cabresto Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using silver-and-black bead-head flies.

Charette Lakes: Fishing for trout was good when using Peach Glitter PowerBait and corn.

Cimarron River: Streamflow near Cimarron Monday morning was 40 cubic feet per second (cfs). Fishing for trout was slow to fair when using Cimarron Specials, San Juan Worm flies, worms and PowerBait. Fishing for trout at Gravel Pit Lakes was slow when using Salmon Peach PowerBait, Sherbet PowerBait, worms and salmon eggs.

Clayton Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using Super Duper lures and Yellow PowerBait. Fishing for catfish was fair when using chicken liver and nightcrawler worms.

Conchas Lake: Fishing for smallmouth bass was fair to good when using Berkley Flicker Shad lures, jerkbaits and nightcrawler worms. Fishing for walleye was fair when trolling using silver Rapala lures, nightcrawler worm harness-spinner rigs and Flicker Shad lures. Fishing for crappie was fair to good when using live minnows and small crankbaits.

Costilla Creek: The Valle Vidal is closed to fishing until July. Anglers reported fishing for trout in an open portion of the creek was good when using Rainbow PowerBait.

Cowles Ponds: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Coyote Creek: Fishing for trout was good when using orange San Juan Worm flies.

Eagle Nest Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using Pink PowerBait and nightcrawler worms. Fishing for pike was fair when using large spinners and spoons. The boat docks are now in the water. For updated lake conditions, visit the <u>park's webpage</u> or call the park office at 575-377-1594.

Eagle Rock Lake: Fishing for trout was slow when using salmon eggs and PowerBait.

Lake Maloya: Fishing for trout was good when using gold beadhead Pheasant-tail Nymph flies and Salmon Peach PowerBait. The ADA dock is open to anglers, with priority given to mobility-impaired persons.

Los Pinos River: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Maxwell Lake 13: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Monastery Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Pistol Pete spinner flies, small, yellow-bodied Panther Martin spinners, brown nymph flies and PowerBait. Morphy Lake: Fishing for trout was very good when using Kastmaster lures, Chartreuse PowerBait and Pink PowerBait.

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 350 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using dry-dropper fly setups and yellow-and-silver Panther Martin spinners.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 218 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using salmon eggs.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 2,870 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Cheese PowerBait.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was 105 cfs.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was 69 cfs.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 138 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using bead-head nymph flies and worms.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: The lake is open from 6:30 am to 8 pm Thursday-Sunday.

Shuree Ponds: Closed to fishing until July.

Springer Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using Rapala minnow lures, Rooster Tail spinners, Rainbow PowerBait and Garlic PowerBait.

Stubblefield Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Ute Lake: Fishing for walleye was fair when trolling using Wally Diver lures, Flicker Shad lures and spinner nightcrawler rigs in 15-20 feet of water. Fishing for white bass was good when trolling using Model A Bomber lures and Wally Diver lures off points. Fishing for crappie was fair when using live minnows at night fishing under lights. Fishing for catfish was fair when using nightcrawler worms and punch bait. Fishing for bass was slow to fair when using drop-shot and shaky-head jigs with 4-inch plastic worms and nightcrawler worms. The main lake water surface temperature was in the high-60 F range, and the water was dirty.

Abiquiu Lake: Fishing for walleye was slow to fair when using jerkbaits. Fishing for bass was slow when using jerkbaits. Fishing for catfish was fair when using nightcrawler worms.

Animas River: Streamflow below Aztec Monday morning was 3,530 cfs.

Albuquerque Area Drains: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Bluewater Lake: Fishing for tiger muskie was good when using Whopper Plopper lures, cut bait and Savage Gear Topwater Duck pattern lures.

Brazos River: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Canjilon Lakes: Fishing for trout was good when using worms and PowerBait.

Cochiti Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Fenton Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using small trout-pattern lures and a variety of PowerBait. For updated lake conditions, visit the <u>park's webpage</u> or call the park office at 575-829-3630.

Grants Riverwalk Pond: Fishing for catfish was fair when using cut carp bait. Fishing for bluegill was good when using yellow Panther Martin spinners.

Heron Lake: Fishing for all species was slow.

Jemez Waters: Streamflow near Jemez Monday morning was 64 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using Pink PowerBait on the Rio De Las Vacas. Fishing in the streams near Fenton Lake was fair to good when using foam topwater flies and PowerBait. Due to the rising popularity of fishing in Valles Caldera National Preserve, the National Park Service began charging a fee for its fishing permits starting April 1, 2023, to support the management of its fishing program. The new fee schedule will be \$20 for an annual pass (\$10 for youth 12-17) and \$5 for a 7-day pass (\$3 for youth 12-17). A State of New Mexico fishing license is also required to fish within Valles Caldera. For more information visit www.nps.gov/vall.

Laguna del Campo: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Lake Farmington: Fishing for bass was fair to good when using plastic wacky rigged worms.

McGaffey Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using PowerBait Trout Nuggets. Fishing for catfish was slow to fair when using Gulp salmon eggs.

Navajo Lake: Fishing for kokanee salmon was fair when using pink and orange squid tipped with corn. Fishing for pike was fair when using crankbaits and Flicker Shad lures. Fishing for bass was fair to good when using grubs and tube jigs.

Rio Chama: Streamflow below El Vado Lake Monday morning was 964 cfs; streamflow below Abiquiu Lake Monday morning was 1,500 cfs. Please remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway 84 at Abiquiu upstream 7 miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters with a bag limit of two trout only.

Rio Grande: Fishing for catfish was good when using cut bait and chicken liver near Corrales.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Gregorio Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Juan River: Streamflow near Archuleta Monday morning was 4,430 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was fair when using leech-pattern flies. Fishing for trout in the bait waters was fair to good when using Red Annelid flies, Salmon Peach PowerBait and salmon eggs.

Seven Springs Brood Pond: Fishing for trout was good when using Chartreuse PowerBait, Green Garlic PowerBait, worms, and Yellow PowerBait.

Tiger Park Reservoir: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Tingley Beach: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using cut bluegill bait and shrimp. Fishing for bass was fair to good when using bluegill-pattern spinner baits.

Tips and Tricks – Dustin and Melissa's Stovetop Frying Pan Walleye with Brussels Sprout Salad



Recipe ingredients

- Walleye fillets (as many as desired)
- Sunflower oil (vegetable oil or peanut oil would work too)
- 1/4 stick of salted butter
- Salt
- Pepper
- 2 garlic cloves
- 12 ounces Brussels sprouts, shredded
- 12 ounces bacon
- 1/2 yellow onion, coarsely chopped
- Juice of 1/2 lemon

Make the brussels sprouts salad first and get it cooking. Cook the walleye fillets after the Brussels sprouts salad has been cooking for about six minutes. This way everything will finish at the same time and can be served hot.



Directions - Brussels Sprouts Salad

- 1. In a large skillet, cook the bacon over medium to high heat until crispy. Transfer it to a plate to cool. Pour off most of the bacon fat into a heat-safe bowl and leave a thin layer of fat in the skillet.
- 2. Cook onions until translucent. Season with salt. Add the Brussels sprouts and cook, stirring occasionally until browned and tender. Add more bacon fat if the pan seems dry.
- 3. Coarsely chop bacon and then stir it into the Brussels sprouts.
- 4. Add salt and pepper to taste. Finish with lemon.

Directions – Stovetop Frying Pan Walleye

- 1. Generously coat the inside of your frying pan with oil. Add ¼ stick of butter.
- 2. Set stove to high heat.
- 3. Salt and pepper the walleye fillets to your liking.
- 4. Wait for frying pan to get very hot. The butter will start to smoke at this point.
- 5. Once the frying pan is very hot, add minced garlic and walleye fillets in one layer with space in between each fillet.
- 6. Cook for 3-4 minutes on each side.
- 7. Add lemon as you desire.
