



# Tips, Tricks and Stories – Interesting Facts About New Mexico Catfish

Catfish are a large and diverse group of ray-finned fish with more than 3,000 species found worldwide, ranging in size from less than 6 inches to more than 9 feet. Catfish inhabit freshwater ecosystems such as rivers, streams, ponds, lakes and reservoirs.

The blue catfish, channel catfish and flathead catfish are the three main species of catfish found in the United States today, and all three species of catfish are found in New Mexico waters. These three species are the most sought-after species by anglers throughout the country.


The channel catfish is the most common in New Mexico because it has adapted well to life in reservoirs. Despite the fact catfish are considered a warm-water species, you can fish for catfish year-round; however, the best water temperatures for angling are between 50 and 80 F, with 70 being the preferred temperature.

#### **CATFISH FUN FACTS**

- Catfish have large, flat heads with elongated bodies.
- Catfish are found mainly in freshwater and are on every continent except Antarctica.
- Catfish are named after their barbels, which resemble a cat's whiskers and are located by the mouth.
- A catfish's barbels are sensory organs that can both smell and taste. This allows catfish to hunt for food effectively in dark and murky waters with low visibility.
- The entire body of the catfish is covered with more than 100,000 taste buds that can taste food before its even in their mouth.
- Catfish have excellent senses of touch and sight. Channel catfish especially have good eyesight, but like most catfish, prefer the bottom of dark, murky waters.
- Most catfish have smooth skin and no scales. Their coloring is usually fairly dull, ranging from bluish-gray to olive-brown.
- Most catfish have no teeth. Instead, they have rough pads in their mouths that help them hold onto their food.
- Catfish have sharp, pointed pectoral and dorsal fins that contain a venom that can cause some pain and swelling if these spines puncture the skin. Always be careful when handling a catfish.
- Smaller catfish and channel catfish especially have sharper dorsal and pectoral fins.



The channel catfish generally weighs between 2-7 pounds and measure 12-24 inches long and live six to seven years on average. Some channel catfish can live up to 10 years.



The blue catfish is the largest species of catfish in North America and can measure, on average, between 24-46 inches and average 20 pounds. Blue catfish can live up to 20 years.

Blue catfish can get up to 5 feet in length and weigh up to 150 pounds.



The flathead catfish averages 25-46 inches in length and weighs between 10-45 pounds. Flathead catfish can live up to 24 years.
