Tips, Tricks and Stories – Diego Baca and Bryan Novotny Spring Bass Fishing Story

With water temperatures in the low 50 F range, we chose to fish for the aggressive, shallower fish, which meant covering a lot of water. With the trolling motor down, Diego and I rotated between lipless crank baits, medium-diving crankbaits and square-bill crankbaits until we dialed the fish into one particular pattern. The 5-foot to 9-foot zone on sunny, main-lake, chunk rock banks with a slight sloping drop mixed with sporadic boulder rocks was the final established

pattern. Some smaller fish were caught shallower on lipless crank baits and square-bill crank baits as well.

For larger fish, Bandit 200/300 series, and Bomber 7A crankbaits in white and firetiger colors were the lure of choice. We were using Daiwa Tatula baitcasting reels spooled with 8-pound P-Line CXX with 7-foot, custom-built Batson RX-7 crankbait rods.

Spring bass fishing is starting to get really good!

Up the ante by taking on the New Mexico Bass Challenge! With the state's record largemouth bass coming in just under 16 pounds and the smallmouth record coming in at seven pounds, it's easy to see why New Mexico isn't overlooked when it comes to bass fishing. The best part about bass fishing in New Mexico is that anglers not only have the opportunity to catch bass from one end of the state to the other, anglers can also fish year-round due to the state's accommodating climate.
