## New Mexico COVID-19 update: 2,510 new cases, totaling 237,889

Ten additional COVID-19 deaths - Saturday, September 4, Sunday, September 5, Monday, September 6, and Tuesday, September 7

SANTA FE – New Mexico state health officials on Tuesday announced 2,510 additional COVID-19 cases. Per the state Department of Health, the most recent cases are:

- A female in her 60s from Bernalillo County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 80s from Bernalillo County. The individual was a resident of BeeHive Homes San Pedro facility in Albuquerque.
- A male in his 50s from Chaves County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A male in his 90s from Curry County. The individual had underlying conditions and was a resident of Clovis Healthcare and Rehabilitation Center in Clovis.
- A male in his 40s from Eddy County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 60s from Eddy County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 70s from Eddy County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.
- A female in her 50s from San Juan County.
- A male in his 60s from San Juan County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 50s from Santa Fe County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.

The number of deaths of New Mexico residents related to COVID-19 is now 4,562.

As of today, there are 388 individuals hospitalized in New Mexico for COVID-19. This number may include individuals who tested positive for COVID-19 out of state but are currently hospitalized in New Mexico. This number does not include New Mexicans who tested positive for COVID-19 and may have been transferred to a hospital out of state.

As of today, there are 205,886 COVID-19 cases designated as having recovered by the New Mexico Department of Health.

The Department of Health strongly encourages the following groups to get tested:

• Symptomatic people displaying the COVID-19 symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle

- pain, headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, and/or loss of taste or smell;
- Asymptomatic people who are close contacts or household members of people in their infectious period who have already tested positive for the coronavirus;
- Asymptomatic people who live or work in congregate settings such as long-term care facilities and group homes;
- Patients who are scheduled for surgery and whose provider has advised them to get tested before the procedure.
