New Mexico COVID-19 update: 1,776 new cases, totaling 255,577

Twelve additional COVID-19 deaths - Saturday, October 2, Sunday, October 3, and Monday, October 4

SANTA FE – New Mexico state health officials on Monday announced 1,776 additional COVID-19 cases. Per the state Department of Health, the most recent cases are:

Three* deaths >30 days:

- A male in his 40s from Lea County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 50s from McKinley County.
- A female in her 70s from Quay County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.

*COVID related deaths are reported when a death certificate has been issued and some death certificates are delayed due to insufficient information.

The number of deaths of New Mexico residents related to COVID-19 is now 4,823.

The ten ZIP codes across the state with the most COVID-19 cases on Monday, Oct. 4 are:

Daily case counts and test numbers are raw data based on information the state receives today - meaning data that has not yet been scrutinized to identify potential duplicates or late-arriving positives or negatives.

Previously reported numbers included one death reported on Dec.12 of a female in her 60's from Union County was not due to COVID infection - this has now been corrected.

Including the above newly reported cases, New Mexico has now had a total of 255,577 COVID-19 cases:

As of today, there are 293 individuals hospitalized in New Mexico for COVID-19. This number may include individuals who tested positive for COVID-19 out of state but are currently hospitalized in New Mexico. This number does not include

New Mexicans who tested positive for COVID-19 and may have been transferred to a hospital out of state.

As of today, there are 226,781 COVID-19 cases designated as having recovered by the New Mexico Department of Health.

The New Mexico Department of Health has active investigations into the positive patients, which includes contact-tracing and swabs of symptomatic individuals who have had contact with the positive cases.

The Department of Health strongly encourages the following groups to get tested:

- Symptomatic people displaying the COVID-19 symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, and/or loss of taste or smell;
- Asymptomatic people who are close contacts or household members of people in their infectious period who have already tested positive for the coronavirus;
- Asymptomatic people who live or work in congregate settings such as long-term care facilities and group homes;
- Patients who are scheduled for surgery and whose provider has advised them to get tested before the procedure.
