New Mexico COVID-19 update: 680 new cases, totaling 511,434

Seventeen additional COVID-19 deaths, 7-Day positivity rate 7.8% for Saturday, February 26, Sunday, February 27, and Monday, February 28

SANTA FE – New Mexico state health officials on Monday announced 680 additional COVID-19 cases. Per the state Department of Health, the most recent cases are:

- A female in her 70s from Otero County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A male in his 70s from San Juan County. The individual was hospitalized.
- A female in her 70s from Taos County. The individual had underlying conditions.
- A male in his 50s from Valencia County. The individual was hospitalized. Six* deaths > 30 days:
 - A female in her 40s from Bernalillo County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.
 - A male in his 30s from Bernalillo County. The individual was hospitalized.
 - A male in his 50s from Bernalillo County. The individual was hospitalized.
 - A female in her 30s from Lincoln County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.
 - A male in his 50s from Rio Arriba County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.
 - A female in her 30s from Sandoval County. The individual was hospitalized and had underlying conditions.

The number of deaths of New Mexico residents related to COVID-19 is now 6,919. Upon further investigation, 1 death reported on 02/14 in Chavez County was not due to COVID.

*COVID related deaths are reported when a death certificate has been issued and some death certificates are delayed due to insufficient information.

As of today, there are 228 individuals hospitalized in New Mexico for COVID-19. This number may include individuals who tested positive for COVID-19 out of state but are currently hospitalized in New Mexico. This number does not include New Mexicans who tested positive for COVID-19 and may have been transferred to a hospital out of state.

As of today, there are 463,188 COVID-19 cases designated as having recovered by the New Mexico Department of Health.

The Department of Health strongly encourages the following groups to get tested:

- Symptomatic people displaying the COVID-19 symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, and/or loss of taste or smell;
- Asymptomatic people who are close contacts or household members of people in their infectious period who have already tested positive for the coronavirus;
- Asymptomatic people who live or work in congregate settings such as long-term care facilities and group homes;
- Patients who are scheduled for surgery and whose provider has advised them to get tested before the procedure.
