
SFPL Presents: An Evening with Tommy Orange

There There tells the story of twelve different characters who each have private reasons for travelling to the Big Oakland Powwow and come together after a brutal act of violence. Mr. Orange's book was selected as a 2022 NEA Big Read title and



is the showcased title for the 2022 Santa Fe Reads Program, an NEA Big Read funding recipient. About the author and event facilitator:

Tommy Orange is the author of the New York Times bestselling novel *There There*, a multigenerational, relentlessly paced story about a side of America few have ever seen: the lives of urban Native Americans. *There There* was one of The New York Times Book Review's 10 Best Books of the Year, and won the Center for Fiction's First Novel Prize and the Pen/Hemingway Award. *There There* was also longlisted for the



National Book Award and was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. Orange graduated from the MFA program at the Institute of American Indian Arts and was a 2014 MacDowell Fellow and a 2016 Writing by Writers Fellow. He is an enrolled member of the

Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes of Oklahoma. He was born and raised in Oakland, California.



Antonia Gonzales is a member of the Navajo Nation and grew up in Arizona and New Mexico. She is the anchor and producer of the award-winning, nationally syndicated radio program National Native News, which airs on tribal and public radio stations across the United States and Canada. It covers social, economic, and cultural issues that impact Indigenous people worldwide.
