




The Department has also developed an interactive Fishing Waters Map with a wealth of information on fishing locations in New Mexico. It displays

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Penasco Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Rio Chama: Streamflow below El Vado Lake and below Abiquiu Lake Monday morning was 103 cfs and 106 cfs, respectively. Fishing for trout below Abiquiu Lake was slow to fair when using spinners, flies and PowerBait. Please remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway

84 at Abiquiu upstream 7 miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters with a bag limit of two trout only.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): Fishing for trout was fair to good when using streamer flies.

San Gregorio Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Juan River: Streamflow near Archuleta Monday morning was 289 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was fair to good when using black, size-26 midge-pattern flies. Fishing for trout in the bait waters was good when using Rooster Tail spinners, salmon eggs, San Juan worm flies and egg-pattern flies.

Seven Springs Brood Pond: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Tiger Park Reservoir: Fishing for trout was good when using black, beadhead yellow-and-chartreuse San Juan worm flies.

Santa Rosa Lake: Fishing for bass was fair when using Panther Martin spinners.



Tips and Tricks – Fishing Braided Line

Have you ever been fishing and getting quite a few bites but not hooking the fish? Sometimes anglers refer to this occasion as "getting soft bites." The fish are swiping at your lures instead of committing to aggressively biting them. One way that anglers can combat soft biting fish is by using braided fishing line. Braided line does not stretch like common fishing line. Eliminating the stretch in your fishing line allows you to get a harder hook set with a faster reaction time. This can make all the difference between hooking the fish or getting a bite from the one that got away.

When using braided line, anglers often choose to add a 3-foot monofilament or fluorocarbon

leader to the end of the braided line. Adding the leader makes the fishing line attached to your

lure less visible to the fish. It is also easier to change lures by retying a knot to your leader as opposed to tying lure knots directly to braided line.

Here is a video on how to tie a knot between braided fishing line and a monofilament leader.
